


















Did you visit the Exhibition Hall?

How likely are you to attend next year's conference?





The pre-conference dinner was excellent!



The pre-dinner: it's OK if the price for the food is shared, but maybe the drinks could be paid separately?




Differentiated instruction: What do best teachers do?


Stanislavsky's System in the ESL Classroom


Visual Story for Grammar Learning

- The quality of presenters varied widely imo. To be honest there was only one talk I went to which I felt was really excellent. Unfortunately I couldn't stay for the final plenary. I'm sure this was very good.
 - In one case, the talk itself was interesting but I didn't feel it reflected the topic announcement.
 - I was very disappointed that Marek Kiczikowiak had had to cancel of course that was beyond anyone's control.
- Some of the workshops were a let-down
- ESL teaching is a second, and very new, career for me. Thank you to those who created this organisation. It's a wonderful resource.
- Maybe the coffee breaks take a bit too long but I understand it's for the sponsors.
- WI-FI Odisee guest account wasn't accessible to all participants.
 The presenters of the sessions 'English goes outside the classroom' and 'American English in the classroom, online and everywhere' were subpar especially because of the content of the workshop they presented.
- The sign at the Odisee campus door was too small, and there were no other signs leading from the station as stated on the website.
- The breaks are too long for me. I'd rather start later/finish earlier or have more sessions.
- The conference programme contained some mistakes: the workshop on BOOK widgets was definitely not about FACEBOOK widgets.
- Signposting to leave the train station ok but then nothing so I had to ask in which direction I had to go left or right so wasted about 10 min. For the food mostly white bread, would be nice to have a choice of wholemeal for organic eaters!
- Generally I found the sessions very good to excellent lively, relevant, hands-on and involving. However, I did attend one which seemed to be very out-of-place at this event. It was overly "academic" (starting from the very highbrow title), the speaker seemed to have no idea on how to engage a room, smile or even project her voice, and when given a group task, the instructions were very unclear, time insufficient and it all just seemed poorly researched and prepared. I was sorry to have attended this instead of one of the others.
- Some breakout sessions did live up to expectations.
- Your webpage did not provide relevant information at first sight
 wireless worked most of the time but not without problems when logging on
 some presenters were good, others operated on a freshman level; this should be specified
 in the programme
 - Most problematic was the presence of photographers: Not only did they disturb, but they did not adhere to good practice in data protection: asking attendees before if it was okay to take photographs. This is not acceptable.
- Given that the sessions were quite long, it would have been nice to hear some theoretical background or published literature to underpin the effectiveness of the ideas presented; instead, some presentations were more like anecdotes.
- The signage was not very clear, and the announcement that the signage started in the train station did not turn out to be true. I had to find out which exit was most preferable

- to reach the Odisee building. After I had asked a stranger for some directions, I started walking towards the building; and only after some time I noticed the signage.
- Quality of presenters rating went up big time because you had David Crystal there;-)
- Some things are 'food' for discussion at the next Belta Board meeting
- Some sessions in the afternoon were too short. coffee breaks were too long, we could have finished earlier if we add reduced the long breaks.
- Mr David Chrystal was excellent and I also enjoyed Ms Christiaens and Nerina Conte.
 However, I was especially disappointed with Patrick Painter's session on differentiation:
 with the excuse of not having much time, he actually never came to the point; a pity for
 such an interesting topic...
- It wasn't clear to me that there was a breakfast available at the venue.
- Microphones for Some speakers if they are not native speakers. (The Greek case session was super hard to understand, she talk quietly and mumbled a bit)
- The plenary sessions were by far the most interesting. Unfortunately the room was rather
 hot, causing myself and many others to doze off.
 There was more than enough food. However, all of the sandwiches had butter on them.
 I'd have loved to see some more on linguistics or academic contexts rather than yet
 another session on differentiation, how to use Facebook or classroom technology
- I really enjoyed listening to every speaker. Choosing was hard and I would have lined to listen to all!
- Perhaps mores concise e-mail messages for registration details would make preconference information more user-friendly.
 Otherwise, an excellent Belta day.
- I had problems with WIFI but this could just have been my device
- The information on the website got better as the day was getting closer
- Two of the speakers were rather content-free. While I find the idea of English Talks very interesting, I hardly think or had the feeling there was enough in there for a full session. Similarly, the session on differentiated learning was a complete disappointment, with an obviously very strong speaker having absolutely no content / tips / research to share. Additionally, the lady from the British Council was occasionally reading off the slides, which I consider a complete no-no for an event that features good presentation practices.
- Five of the six speakers I saw, used the session to sell their project rather than giving is practical tips.
- IMHO, the sandwiches were the weakest aspect of the day it would be nice to have perhaps more "modern" toppings? For example hummus-type of spreads for the vegetarian options (i.e. less mayo etc). But hey, I'm a foodie!

 Also, I found that the afternoon workshops I went to were much less interesting than the morning ones (which were fabulous!!) --> perhaps ask for more details about a future presentation before you select them?
- The length of the sessions was short and you could feel that some of the speakers were hurried because of that.

What are your thoughts about the Exhibition Hall? Is there a specific publisher you would like to be present at future BELTA Days?

 giving/discussing tips for practical application in the participants' various teaching
 contexts

So that the presentations could be better organized and prepared).

The last conference I attended was about grammar and I really liked it (concrete material and the presenter was really dynamic).

In conclusion, I would say that it was a pity that the conferences were too short. Sometimes, the presenter had other things to explain but they had no time to do that. Why don't you short the breaks (sometimes 30 minute break) and give more time for the conferences?

- It was a very enjoyable experience indeed, but I would like to point out a major flaw: the name tags served no purpose. The names were too small, the kind of visitor (whether volunteer, speaker, organiser or attendee) was illegible and all was on a blue background, making it even worse. As a volunteer, I was supposed to help Joris De Roy in the Exhibition Hall and, when offering to help the publishers, they looked at me questioningly, not knowing why an attendee should offer help.
 - Badges, serving the purpose of getting other people's names or knowing instantly who does what and therefore who could help one, would benefit of clear writing, big letters for the essential information and no clashing colours. This would make BELTA Day an even better event than the excellent day you organised.
